# **FISHERIES WORKSHOP**

## **INTRODUCTION**

The Anishinabek/Ontario Fisheries Resource Centre (A/OFRC) hosted a morning of activities for students from Hillside School on Wednesday, October 7, 2015 at Brian's Channel in Kettle & Stony Point First Nation.

#### **METHODS**

A/OFRC hosted a workshop with two groups of 17 students from grade classrooms. The 5th workshop began with а introductory circle where students were asked to give their name and describe their favourite outdoor The fisheries activity. demonstration was lead by A/ OFRC's fisheries biologists, and electrofishing included an demonstration fish and identification exercise. games were prepared in advance, and included a "day at the beach" relay race, School of Fish game, and a scavenger hunt. A group discussion on Invasive Species, specifically Phragmites, took place at the end of the workshop while waiting for the school bus.

#### RESULTS
