TRADITIONAL KNOWLEDGE TRANSFER WORKSHOP

INTRODUCTION

The Anishinabek/Ontario Fisheries Resource Centre, in partnership with the Whitefish River First Nation hosted a 3-day workshop on traditional fish harvesting techniques. This workshop took place from October 21—23, 2015 at the Whitefish River First Nation Community Centre.

METHODS

The series of workshops were community led, and the A/OFRC provided materials, supplies, an extra boat and a boat operator. A/OFRC also provided a display booth that highlighted past projects in the community. The topic for Day One was preparing, setting and maintaining a net, which was led by two local fishermen. Day Two's topic was filleting fish, led by local fishermen, and a canning packaging demonstration led Toulouse. Three's Myna Day activities included a smoking fish

demonstration led by Edward Pitawanakwat and a fish pie making demonstration led by Doreen Jacko. Presentations by Whitefish River Nation's Legacy Proiect Coordinator, A/OFRFC's Fisheries Technician Keith Nahwegahbow on past projects completed in Whitefish River First Nation, and the Source Water Protection Project Committee were peppered throughout the workshop.

RESULTS

An average of 10 people were in attendance for all sessions, with the attendance reaching up to 15 people for some sessions. The local day care paid a visit during the canning and

packaging workshop. A local elementary school class visited during the smoking fish demonstration. Over 20 people were in attendance for the community feast that took place on the last day.
