

## ANISHINABEK/ONTARIO FISHERIES RESOURCE CENTRE

The Anishinabek/Ontario Fisheries Resource Centre (A/OFRC) originated from the Anishinabek Conservation and Fishing Framework Agreement between the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) – Anishinabek Nation and the MNR signed in July of 1993. The Centre is a not-for-profit corporation and an independent "Centre of Excellence" for fisheries assessment and management, recognized and trusted by First Nations, governments, and all users of fisheries resources. Governed by a Board with majority representation from Indigenous UOI communities, our mission is to report on stock status, evaluate stresses on fish populations and habitats, providing advice of fisheries conservation and management issues wherever there is an interest to member communities of the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) – Anishinabek Nation.

Over the last 30 years, the A/OFRC has completed over 400 fisheries projects with AN First Nations Communities.

Once a project proposal is developed, the A/OFRC staff and Project Planning Committee will determine the feasibility of the project for our 2026 field season. Final decisions regarding the project will be made in **early 2026**, and this will be communicated with your representative.
